

NOTE TO PARENTS



Language is a tool that we use every day to express ourselves and to communicate with others. We think, act, and relate to the world around us through language. Thus, teaching students language as a series of skills is more helpful than teaching it to them as a set of concepts.

At LEAD, our approach is to identify the critical skills that your child needs to be able to understand, speak, read, and write English well. Let us see how the lessons would differ in a traditional and a LEAD classroom.

Traditional Classroom (Teaching a Fictional Story)

- Either the teacher or the students will read aloud the story in the class.
- Students will construct the meaning of the story based on the explanation that the teacher gives. This explanation cannot be applied to other stories.
- The teacher will provide students with answers to the text-back questions. Sometimes answers may be discussed in class.
- The students will need to learn and reproduce answers in examination. There might be some questions they may not know how to answer.
- Grammar, listening and speaking, and writing are disconnected from the story and thus, difficult to grasp.





LEAD Classroom (Teaching a Fictional Story)

- Students will engage in the first and second read of the story using several methods.
- Students will construct the meaning of the story by using strategies such as visualisation, note-taking, making connections that they can apply to other stories as well
- The teacher will provide students with mind maps that can help them think of their own responses to text-back questions.
- The students will know how to write original answers and will be ready to answer any question in the examination.
- Grammar, listening and speaking, and writing are integrated with the story and thus, easier to learn.

In order to ensure that your child easily acquires the skills needed for mastery in each type of text, we group together the same types of texts and teach them as one unit. This avoids confusion and ensures focused practice for your child while empowering him or her to use English confidently in their day to day lives.




